Elderly/Totally Disabled Tax Relief Program

Completed applications are due biannually by May 15, 2022. Anyone applying after April 15, 2022 must apply in person; <u>be sure to call in advance for an appointment</u>. We will be happy to assist you in filing your application. Please call (860-487-3122) in advance for an appointment so we may provide the time and attention necessary.

To be eligible for such a tax credit:

- You or your spouse must be at least 65 years of age as of Dec 31, 2021 or over 18 and permanently and totally disabled per Social Security.
- You must be a permanent resident of the State of Connecticut. You must own the property or hold a tenancy for life or for a term of years, which makes the applicable liable for payment of taxes (CGS Sec. 12-48) as of October 1, 2021. The property must be the applicant's primary residence (domicile).
- Your 2021 income cannot exceed \$ 37,600 (single) or \$ 45,800 (married). Income definition: Qualifying income is defined as adjusted gross income for IRS purposes plus any other income not included in such adjusted gross income.
- You must provide the Assessor with a copy of your SSA 1099 for 2021, or its equivalent, from Social Security and your 2021 federal income tax return if you file one. The Assessor may require any other proof of income that may be necessary for the certification of the claim, such as interest/dividend statements and pension statements.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION NOTES



Winter bestows a whole new look on the parks and preserves that Willington is fortunate to have. The lack of foliage reveals a multitude of landscape features: waterways, stone walls, hill sides and other views not visible during the rest of the year. Don't let snow stop you from getting some exercise on our great trails. Especially with a fresh snowfall, the forest landscape takes on a whole new perspective. If the snow is deep enough, the Recreation Dept. has snowshoes to loan if you don't have your own and you'd like to try that experience. Much of the time, though, it isn't long after a snowfall that other enthusiastic snowshoers and hikers have packed the trails enough to not need snowshoes. Most of the trails are also cross-country skiable with the Taylor Trail being the most skier-friendly. Depending on your fitness and skill level, you may have to walk a section or two on the others. As always, please be considerate of others and help us protect wildlife by keeping dogs on leashes.

The 300-acre Fenton-Ruby Park and Wildlife Preserve and Drobney Sanctuary on Moose Meadow Road has 4-plus miles of trails through woods, over ridges and along ponds and streams. A kiosk with maps and a trailhead map with a QR code is located at the parking area and a box with nature trail guides is located a short distance down the Taylor Trail. Trail maps are located at all trail intersections. Also, a one-mile trail in Ashford is accessible via the Ashford Link Trail off the Ruby Trail.

The 28-acre Talmadge Tract, which contains the Talmadge Spur Trail with 1 ½ and 2-mile loops, will take you through scenic woodlands and along gravel Mason Road. This tract abuts the 400-acre UConn Moss Forest Tract, and on the other side of Mason Road is the 138-acre Royal Knowlton Preserve. Several miles of the Connecticut Blue Trail (Nipmuck) run through this area, with a portion along the Fenton River as it flows through a deep ravine. The 3/4-mile Knowlton Spur Trail connects the Nipmuck Trail to the Talmadge Trail. Paper maps and a map with a QR code can be found at the Talmadge/Knowlton trailheads on Mason Road where there is a parking area, and also at the sign where the Nipmuck crosses Mason Rd.

Joshua's Trust's Chenes Roches Preserve in north Willington also offers a great hike with many interesting landscape features. See a description under "Town Parks and Amenities".

If you are interested in taking an active part in helping the Town manage its environmental resources, the Commission has an opening for an alternate member. Alternate members participate in meetings and may be seated as voting members in the absence of regular members. Until further notice, our meetings will be held remotely via Zoom on the third Wednesday of every month. See the link posted on the Town website under meetings. We are pleased to announce that The Packing House reopened on September 18, 2021 for **LIVE PERFORMANCES** and **FILM SCREENINGS**! We reopened with responsible COVID practices in place including: 50% capacity (max 70); mask requirement; socially distanced tables; and mandatory sign-in (in the event of contact tracing).

JANUARY 8, 2022: "Acoustic Duo Foolish Wisely" (Folk/Americana). 7:30pm

FOOLISH WISELY lives in the space between waking and dreaming. Intricate folk/americana-inspired songwriting supported by a diverse variety of instrumentation lays ground for luxuriant harmonies to paint over, which bring to life a surreal-yet-familiar world that exists within us all. The band is made up of RJ Mac Carthaigh and Julia Autumn Ford, both multi instrumentalists and internationally touring artists with their own extensive histories in groups including Belle of the Fall, Field of Birds and The Slambovian Circus of Dreams. Drawing from distinct musical paths, this energetic group of seasoned players bring a unique approach to their performances, delivering unmistakably tight vocal harmonies and scorching tempos that are the benchmark of the genre. Eric Lee (guitar/fiddle), Sean Davis (guitar), Gareth Buckley (bass), John Benjamin (mandolin), & Chris Boucher (banjo), perform traditional material and Lee's original songs with a deep sense of honoring the legacy of bluegrass. Together, they show how the love of music and a good sense of humor can transcend trying times.



FEBRUARY 5, 2022: "Singer / Songwriter & Multi-Instrumentalist Kala Farnham" (Indie/Folk). 7:30pm

KALA FARNHAM is a multi-instrumentalist singer/songwriter hailing from the Quiet Corner of CT. Kala's signature songwriting has been described as a reinvention of the folk tradition made popular by artists such as Joni Mitchell and Joan Baez.She has been praised for her classical undertones and playful dose Broadway theatricality onstage, and a lyricism that springs to life with creative storytelling, cultural references, and rich metaphor. Her first full-length studio album, "Anahata: Wake Up Your Heart", was nominated for "Best Americana Album" in RI's Motif Music Awards alongside a nomination for "Best Female Americana Vocalist". In 2015, she was selected to be an Official Showcase Artist in Folk Alliance International's SERFA Music Conference. October 2016 marked the release of her 2nd studio album,



"Samadhi: Home Is Where You Are" as well as another Motif nomination for Best Americana Album. Kala is an alumni of the Johnny Mercer Songwriters Project and the winner of the 2017 Rhode Island Songwriters Association Performing Songwriter Contest.



FEBRUARY 19, 2022: "Singer / Songwriter Sally Rogers" (Folk). 7:30pm

Folk singer, songwriter and educator SALLY ROGERS has performed from coast to coast for forty years! She has performed for audiences around the world at festivals, concerts, schools, and most any other public place you can imagine. Sally is equally talented at stirring a crowd to sing, or at using music to draw out even the shyest child in a classroom to become an active and enthusiastic participant. Widely known for her crystal clear voice, Sally accompanies herself with guitar, banjo and mountain dulcimer. Many of these instruments are used in her solo performances, as a duo with her husband Howie Bursen, with long-time buddy Claudia Schmidt, or as part of her interactive school residencies. To date, Sally has recorded five solo albums, four children's recordings, two albums with Howie Bursen, four albums with Claudia Schmidt, and has participated in numerous other recording projects. Her most recent collaborative album, We are Welcomed, was released in 2016. In addition to your musical talents, Sally is an accomplished textile artist, creating unique and colorful quilt panels. Her work will be on display at the Dye & Bleach House Community Gallery, and available for viewing during her performance.



MARCH 12, 2022: "Sperry Creek" (Bluegrass). 7:30pm

SPERRY CREEK bring fresh harmonies and instrumentation that hold true to the bluegrass genre. This five-piece band from Connecticut formed after some local pickers spent the height of the pandemic keeping each other sane through socially distant backyard jam sessions. It didn't take the group long to realize that good sounds were happening. They soon adopted the name of a nearby creek, and the band was officially formed in the summer of 2020. Sperry Creek is made up of longtime musicians Scott Freemantle (bass); Marilyn Toback-Reveley (guitar); Bill Reveley (fiddle); Corrie Folsom-O'Keefe (mandolin) and Dan O'Keefe (banjo), who all share a passion for bluegrass music. A culmination of musicians from other wellknown CT bands, Sperry Creek has allowed us to share our love of music with others throughout the New England bluegrass scene. MARCH 17, 2022: "20 Feet From Stardom". 2013. (PG-13). 7:00pm

"20 Feet from Stardom" is a 2013 American documentary film directed by documentary filmmaker Morgan Neville and was produced by Gil Friesen. "Backup singers live in a world that lies just beyond the spotlight. Their voices bring harmony to the biggest bands in popular music, but we've had no idea who these singers are or what lives they lead, until now." IMDb. The film follows the behind-the-scenes experiences of backup singers and stars Darlene Love, Judith Hill, Merry Clayton, Lisa Fischer, Tata Vega, and Jo Lawry, among many others. On March 2, 2014, it won the Academy Award for Best Documentary Feature at the 86th Academy Awards, 23 years after the similar documentary In the Shadow of the Stars (which focused on the members of an opera chorus instead of its stars) won the same award.

Collaborative Play: Building Big and Working Together

Collaborative Play: Building Big and Working Together is an interdisciplinary art curriculum designed to give eighth grade students confidence in innovation and fabrication, and develop collaboration and critical thinking skills. As the public education system prepares students for placement into the real world, it is important to understand that students, no matter what future careers they find themselves in, need the ability and skills to communicate effectively and work as a part of a team. The art classroom is the perfect opportunity to create a laboratory for student development that focuses on project based collaboration between the entire class, and gives agency to students as their own advocates of learning.

The future of the human race relies on innovation. Finding new ways of thinking, doing, and making, to ensure that climate change and pollution do not get the best of us. In order to prepare students to become innovative thinkers, schools must prepare students to think beyond themselves and beyond their limits as a single person. The intention of *Collaborative Play: Building Big and Working Together* is to teach students that they are stronger together, and with each other they can accomplish projects that extend beyond themselves, both physically and cognitively.

The conceptual framework for *Collaborative Play: Building Big and Working Together* stems from an understanding of the importance of team building and an interest in educational toys and the impact they can have on an eighth grade student. Students will be encouraged to think creatively and invent their own ideas, drawing from all disciplines and other classes they are taking. By providing students with the tools, skills, and guidance, a whole new level of creativity and confidence can be achieved.

In 2019, Netflix released season two of *Abstract: The Art of Design*. Episode three is titled *Design for Play*, and features artist and designer Cas Holman. Cas Holman is the founder of toy company, *Heroes Will Rise*, where she designs and "manufactures tools for the imagination" (Holman). The materials Holman designs are meant to be manipulable parts and pieces which inspire constructive play, imaginative forms, and cooperative interactions between people.

Holman's most recent tool/toy (tool/toy is Holman's term for the toys she manufactures, they are both tools for learning and construction as well as toys (Holman)) is called *Rigamajig*. *Rigamajig* is a large-scale building kit for hands-on free play and learning. The collection of wooden planks, wheels, pulleys, nuts, bolts and rope, allow children to follow their curiosity through play. Abstract in their identity, these tool/toys inspire children and adults to imagine the origin and story of the toy as well as how to use it. "What is it?" and "What does it do?" are answered in intuitive details, play prompts, and semiotic clues, making the instructions implicit in the tool/toy.



Collaborative Play: Building Big and Working Together is explicitly inspired by Holman's philosophy of play and the intersecting early childhood curriculum *Anji Play* designed in China by Cheng Xueqin, Director, Office of Pre-Primary Education, Anji County Department of Education, Zhejiang Province (Xueqin). Holman discovered *Anji Play* after Xueqin reached out after seeing her work with *Rigamajig*. Holman began traveling to China to study the schools in which a complete curriculum of *Anji Play* was being taught. At this point, *Rigamajig*, is just a tool for educators, but how can the philosophies of play

behind Rigamajig, be implemented across curricula like Anji Play.

Collaborative Play: Building Big and Working Together is an attempt to incorporate the curricula of Anji Play and the philosophies of Cas Holman and *Rigamajig* into mainstream public education. Histories of the impacts of play on childhood development and creative experience are expressed in Amy F. Ogata's book, *Designing the Creative Child: Playthings and Places in Midcentury America*, and book, *Makers, Crafters, Educators: Working for Cultural Change* edited by Elizabeth Garber, Lisa Hochtritt, and Manisha Sharma. These books provide a deep historical context of educational toys and how play has been shown to aid in childhood development.

Charles Baudelaire, one of the pedagogies discussed by Ogata states, "in their games children give evidence of their great capacity for the abstraction and high imaginative power" (Ogata 36). As well as Fredrick Frobel and Maria Montessori who believe that objects teach real skill and abstract values. Toys act as an entry point for students to access greater understanding of life values.

Specifically, this curriculum has been inspired by the pedagogy of Simon Nicholson's loose parts play theory. Developed in 1970, Nicholson claimed that in a play, loose parts are materials that can be moved, carried, combined, redesigned, lined up, and taken apart and put back together in multiple ways. They are materials with no specific set of directions that can be used alone or combined with other materials. Encouraging children to use resources as they choose can provide a wider range of opportunities than one that is purely adult led.

The format of the curricula is designed based on methods of team building. Team building is a collective term for various types of activities used to enhance social relations and define roles within teams, often involving collaborative tasks. Traditionally, team building occurs in four phases: framing device, planning time, execution of the task, and debriefing. *Collaborative Play: Building Big and Working Together* uses phases two and four, planning time and debriefing, as a framework for the class's success. During planning time, students will gather collectively in a circle, making sure each student can see each other, and discuss a plan. The instructor need not offer questions or guidance during this time. Students may spend five minutes planning or an hour. It is important to let students know that they can come back to planning time. They may plan for five minutes, attempt the task, and fail, realizing that they need to plan out their task more. The teacher can play the role of a facilitator, where if everything is going wrong, offer more planning time, or if all is going very wrong, offer a clue or hint to get the ball rolling again.



In team building after each task/activity a debrief occurs. The debrief occurs even if the task was not completed or if the task was failed. During debrief the teacher can act once again as a facilitator. Offering questions that help the students understand their role, and their fellow classmates' roles during the activity and what things went well and what things need to be changed for next time. In the art classroom, debriefing can also be used to evaluate the success of an artwork and what and how the work is referencing within the art world.

Collaborative Play: Building Big and Working Together will help students understand one another, and that working together and supporting each other is far more effective than trying to tear each other apart. Cognitively students at this age are developing problem solving and thinking skills, question things beyond face value, aware of how current



actions can affect the future (Morin). Using the art classroom as a means to engage students socially with good intentions can be beneficial not only for the completion of a successful art project, but also throughout their careers as students in the district.

Economic Development Commission



The design commercial and South Willington Village regulations are now complete, but the Economic Development Commission has a bit more clean up. We are proposing a design district for the large commercial and industrial parcels in Town. This proposal will empower the Zoning Commission to complete an early onset review, identifying challenges that may stop projects or green light projects in the design phase. We hope this will giving certainty to a project prior to final submittal of drawings. If a project is not appropriate for a site or would fit nicely we owe the respondent a professional, preliminary review.

There have been a significant increase in the number of inquiries and interest in Town as businesses look at Willington. EDC has professional staff in the Planning Office to field business proposals. EDC anticipates that we will be moving from encouraging business development to project management in late 2021 and beyond.

All the while, EDC is keeping a keen eye of the Plan of Conservation and Development to ensure that projects fit in into that vision.

We are cleaning up the Willington business list and will be calling and visiting businesses in Town to update their contact information and determining business needs.

The Town has enacted an ordinance to distribute the American Rescue Plan monies. EDC has proposed that some of the federal funds go to small businesses in Town. As you know the Town administers the application, justification and payment of these funds. This process is a bit different than the collection and allocation of Willington taxpayer funds. ARP funding is intended as a rapid pandemic response and the Town acts as the pass through entity.

Historical Society

On December 10th, Willington held their annual tree lighting on the Town Green and the Glazier Tavern was open for visitors. The Tavern was welcoming and warm with 2 wood-burning fireplaces going all evening and a fire pit available outside. Warm cider was available inside (it is a Tavern, after all) and baked goods were provided by Willington Historical Society volunteers. For several members of the community, this was their first opportunity to see the Tavern, although access was somewhat constrained due to COVID concerns. Visitors are welcome to attend future WHS meetings, listed on the Town and WHS websites. During winter, please check for last-minute weather changes.

We often use this space to highlight interesting events, ongoing work at the Glazier Tavern or special projects. We ask for volunteers or donations or just ask the people with present or past ties to Willington to take an interest in our history.

But this time, we are going to ask you to take an interest in your own ancestors. There are several fascinating resources available online. One favorite is **Chronicling America**, an online resource provided by the Library of Congress, <u>https://chroniclingamerica.loc.gov/</u> which is easy to navigate. The US newspapers can be filtered by date and location. Here is an interesting thing we found: search with names/places also spelled <u>incorrectly</u> because every publication spelled things differently. You may find, as we did, how many trout were stocked in a certain year, what vehicle was used on a local mail route and which family had holiday visitors. It's a lot of fun to see a glimpse of the past.

Interesting also is to find your ancestors' graves in the US on **Find A Grave**. Volunteers have a hobby of photographing every headstone in a cemetery all around the country. Try looking at <u>www.FindAGrave.com</u> to see where your ancestors are buried.

<u>www.MyHeritage.com</u> is a paid site with a 14-day free trial. It is interesting to see who originally entered the information from an overlapping family tree. You don't know who you may be related to until you look! Another paid site is <u>www.ancestry.com</u> with links to census documents and ships manifests for your immigrant ancestors from the National Archives.

No discussion of genealogy would be complete without mentioning a wonderful website, <u>www.FamilySearch.org</u>, sponsored by the Church of the Latter-day Saints (Mormon). You can set up a free account and immediately find information and census and cemetery documentation online. Family Search also lists where the information was found for individual records. Viewing census information, you can see your ancestors' and their families, where they lived, also listing an occupation. This is your opportunity to say "I didn't know that!"

Willington Historical Society depends heavily on donations from our generous contributors for volunteering at the Tavern as well as for monetary donations. Work at the Glazier Tavern is continuing as we are striving to meet ADA compliance requirements for a public facility. It is our hope that Glazier Tavern will become a resource for small gatherings and meetings in Willington, but the building will have to meet code standards first. Please contact us if you would like to donate your skills to help us achieve our goal.

We have been very fortunate recently to have been contacted by people regarding Willington-related artifacts that relatives had in their homes. These pieces will be displayed in the future. We are always looking for photographs of Willington residents, locations and businesses, labeled ones are best.

Greetings Residents,

As winter is in full swing we would like to remind you of a few things. Please see the town's ordinances and rules as follows. If you have any questions or concerns please feel free to call the town garage at 860-684-9313. Have a safe and healthy new year!

SNOW REMOVAL ORDINANCE:

Volume 6, Page 81: Pursuant to Section 7-148(15), Connecticut General Statutes, use of Town roads is restricted as follows:

No person shall deposit any snow or ice onto the traveled portion of any Town road. Any person found guilty of a violation of this section shall be fined fifty (\$50) dollars by the Board of Selectman or the Public Works Director.

This includes the draining of water from sump pumps and/or other property drainage. Besides the Town fine, residents are also liable for damage to the road and any accidents that may occur as a result of water, ice or snow deposited on the roads.

WINTER PARKING BAN:

A parking ban is in effect during snow storms. Cars parked on Town roads overnight may be towed at the owner's expense. Tune to WFSB (CBS) or WVIT (NBC) for parking ban information.

MAILBOXES:

Your mailbox should be in good repair, firmly attached to a solid post and properly placed so no part of it is over the pavement. It will have to withstand countless tons of flying snow this winter and may require periodic maintenance. If a mailbox or post is pushed over or damaged as a result of snow or slush coming off a snowplow, it is considered a winter hazard and the Town will not repair or replace the mailbox or post. The height of the bottom of the mailbox to the street should be between $42^{\circ} - 48^{\circ}$ and the mailbox door should be 6 to 8 inches back from the front face of the curb or road edge. In the event a Town plow hits a mailbox, it will be repaired by the Public Works Department.

PORTABLE BASKETBALL HOOPS:

Portable basketball hoops and similar items should NOT be in the Town right-of-way. The Town is not responsible for damage done by plows to such items left in the Town right-of-way.

CATCH BASINS & STORM INLETS:

Help minimize street flooding by shoveling snow and ice from in front of the storm inlet nearest your house. This includes keeping catch basin grates free of leaves and other debris all year long!

SAND/SALT MIXTURE:

Sand/salt mixture is available at the Transfer Station with a 10 gallon limit per storm.

School Building Committee

Willington School Building Committee Update October 2021

The Willington School Building Committee (SBC) has been meeting since January 2021 and continues to research and define a Pre-K - Grade 8 school to meet Willington's educational needs. It is part of the committee's commitment to follow the SBC charge. At this time, the SBC has not determined if a new school building or renovated school building would be best for Willington. The SBC is currently in the process of hiring consultants to help move the process forward.

The SBC was made aware of concerns that community members felt the committee was only looking to build a new school on a new site because they had created a *Land Acquisition subcommittee* (recently renamed Land Assessment Committee). The SBC discussed land owned by the Town of Willington in public session and parcels of land identified by the Board of Education during executive session. The SBC will utilize executive session to review potential land sites, as discussing parcels publicly may risk causing a price increase. Land acquisition may be required as part of the process, whether building a new school on a new site or completing a renovation. As part of the funding reimbursement and grant application, the Office of School Construction Grants and Review (OSCGR) has a minimum acreage requirement that all school districts seeking funding, must meet.

The SBC continues to hold <u>regular meetings</u> via Zoom on the first and third Wednesday of each month and <u>agendas</u> and <u>minutes</u> can be found on the town website. We encourage townspeople to <u>subscribe to e-Alerts</u> found on the front page of the town website to receive notifications of meetings. Meetings are recorded and can be accessed via the town's <u>YouTube page</u>. Official committee information and documents are available on the <u>SBC webpage</u>. The SBC recently updated its <u>Frequently Asked Questions</u> document. Community members may provide feedback through email to <u>sbc@willingtonct.org</u> or participate during the present to speak portion of the SBC meetings.

Greetings Willington Residents:

We are strongly encouraging everyone to continuing making payments by mail, by use of our drop box located outside the front entrance or online at <u>www.willingtonct.org</u>. Please note that there is a convenience fee of 2.95% for credit cards and \$1.95 for EFT for online payments. As a reminder interest cannot be waived per CT State Statute 12-146.

How can I pay My Bill?

The Revenue Office accepts cash, money orders or personal checks for payment at the office. If you need to make your payment in person, we ask that you wear your mask and practice 6 foot social distancing. If our office is closed, you can leave a check in our Drop Box outside the front door of the building. Our mailing address is 40 Old Farms Rd, Willington CT 06279 if you want to mail in a payment. Please enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope, if you would like a receipt mailed back to you. You may also pay on line at <u>www.willingtonct.org</u> and click on "OnLine Payments" under the "Citizen Action Center".

Why did I get a motor vehicle tax bill in December?

This is your motor vehicle supplemental bill. This bill was generated because you were issued a new motor vehicle registration, or have transferred an existing registration, at some time after Oct. 1, 2020, but before Sept. 30, 2021. You are being billed only for the number of months from your registration date until the end of the assessment year.

When is my Payment Due? When is it considered Late?

Payments due January 1, 2022 must be received, or postmarked, no later than Tuesday February 1, 2022.

Interest is charged at a rate of 1 ½% per month from the due date, with a minimum interest charge of \$2.00. Failure to receive a bill does not invalidate the tax or interest per CT State Statute.
