From the Assessor's Office

EXEMPTION PROGRAMS

The Assessor's Office administers exemption programs which benefit the elderly, disabled, blind, and veterans.

Homeowner's Program for the Low-Income Elderly and Totally Disabled:

Starting February 1, 2024, the Assessor's Office will be accepting NEW and RENEWAL applications for the homeowner program for the low-income elderly and totally disabled. This program is income based. Depending on income and household size, the tax savings reduction can range from \$150 - \$1,250. Renewal applications will be sent to participants already enrolled in the program. Applications are also available on the town's website, at the Assessor's Office and by mail. Call 860-487-3122 to be sent an application packet. Applications can be mailed, with supporting documentation, to the Assessor's Office, and must be received in the office no later than 6:00 pm on Monday, April 15, 2024. Applications submitted between April 16, 2024 and May 15, 2024 must be filed in person at the Assessor's Office. The application DEADLINE IS 4:00 pm, Wednesday, May 15th, 2024.

This is a two-year program, with renewal applications every other year. Taxpayers who were approved last year do NOT NEED TO REFILE THIS YEAR, unless your income is lower, making you eligible for a higher abatement amount. To be eligible for the tax credit:

- You or your spouse must be at least 65 years of age as of Dec 31, 2023, or over 18 and permanently and totally disabled per Social Security or similar government program.
- You must be a permanent resident of the State of Connecticut. You must own the property or hold a tenancy for life or for a term of years, which makes you liable for payment of taxes (CGS Sec. 12-48) as of October 1, 2023. The property must be the applicant's primary residence (domicile).
- Your 2023 income cannot exceed \$43,800 (single) or \$53,400 (married). Qualifying income is defined as adjusted gross income for IRS purposes plus any other income not included in such adjusted gross income. The application packet will include a handout on What is Considered Income?
- A copy of your current (2023) income tax return must be presented at the time of application if one is filed with the IRS, along with statements of any untaxable interest and a copy of your Social Security SSA-1099. If an income tax return is not filed, statements of all income must be presented. These include statements of wages, lottery winnings, taxable pensions, IRA's, interest, dividends, rental income, Social Security SSA 1099, railroad retirement, veteran's payments, etc.
- If you are under the age of 65, proof of permanent total disability benefits under Social Security, or, if not qualified under Social Security proof of disability benefits under any federal, state or local government retirement or disability plan.

Totally Disabled: Any individual who is less than 65 years of age and is receiving Social Security disability payments may be eligible for a 1,000 reduction in your assessment. To qualify you must file an application and proof of 100% disability from Social Security (form TPQY) or a copy of your "Award Letter" that states disability. This application only needs to be filed once. The filing deadline is October 1, 2024 for the 2024 Grand List. There is also a program to exempt a specially equipped and modified motor vehicle used to transport a disabled person for no cost. Details are available in the Assessor's Office.

Blind: Any individual that presents a Certification of Legal Blindness from the Board of Education and Services for the Blind, BESB, that states he/she is considered to be legally blind may be eligible for a 3,000 reduction of their assessment. The filing deadline is October 1, 2024 for the 2024 Grand List.

Veterans: If you are a veteran that was on active duty during a period of war or are still serving during a period of war you may be entitled to an exemption. An original or certified copy of your honorable discharge (DD-214) must be filed with the Town Clerk in the Willington Land Records prior to October 1, 2024 for the 2024 Grand List. There is no fee for this service. If your household income for 2023 was less than \$43,800 (single) or \$53,400 (married) you may be eligible for a doubling of the basic exemption amount of 1,500.

If the veteran is currently serving in an active theater of war or hostilities, a parent, guardian, spouse, or legal representative of such person may file a notarized statement that the service member is currently serving and is unable to appear in person by reason of such service. Such statement shall be received before October 1, 2024. If you are a disabled veteran with a disability rating from the VA of at least 10%, you may be entitled to an increased exemption. Excluding VA disability payments, if your 2023 household income was less than \$18,000 (single person households) or \$21,000 (married households), you are eligible for a higher exemption amount. The filing deadline is October 1.



From the Assessor's Office

<u>Active-duty members</u> of the United States armed forces (including reserves and National Guard) are eligible for the exemption from taxes of one motor vehicle upon application and may also be eligible for the veteran's assessment reduction. If the claimant is currently serving in and is unable to appear in person to establish such right, he or she may establish such right, until such time as he or she appears personally to exhibit his discharge or copy, by forwarding to the town clerk annually a written statement, signed by the commanding officer of his unit, ship or station or by some other appropriate officer. Applications for all programs can be obtained at the Assessor's Office and can be sent to you by mail or by email. Please call the office at 860-487-3122 during our regular business office hours for further information.

2024 REVALUATION

The 10/1/2024 Grand List is a revaluation year for the Town of Willington. CT General Statute Section 12-62 requires the revaluation of all real estate in CT town every five years. The last revaluation in Willington was for the 10/1/2018 Grand List. Willington approved a one-year extension to conduct a revaluation because the town was without an Assessor. The 2023 values will be used to determine taxes payable in the summer of 2024.

New 490 Values will take effect for the 2024 revaluation. Many property owners in Willington have land classified as farm, forest and open space under the PA 490 program, the use value assessment program in CT (CGS Sec. 12-107a – 12-107f). Every 5 years, the Secretary of the Office of Policy and Management and the Commissioner of Agriculture are required to develop per acre values for use in setting the use assessments for farm and forest land. Farmland values are based on agricultural rents. Forest land values are based on characteristics such as the type and density of trees, saw-log prices and tree growth rates. Open space values are set by each town and cannot be lower than the value of the land as a component of farmland.

Motor Vehicle Supplemental Bills have been mailed 2nd Installment RE & MVS Due by: Thursday, February 1st, 2024

Greetings Willington Residents:

We are strongly encouraging everyone to continuing making payments by mail, by use of our drop box located outside the front entrance or online at <u>www.willingtonct.gov</u>. Please note that there is a convenience fee of 2.50% for credit cards, flat fee of \$3.95 for debit cards and \$0.95 for EFT for online payments. As a reminder interest cannot be waived per CT State Statute 12-146.

How can I pay My Bill?

The Revenue Office accepts cash, money orders or personal checks for payment at the office. If our office is closed, you can leave a check in our Drop Box outside the front of the building. Our mailing address is 40 Old Farms Rd, Willington CT 06279 if you want to mail in a payment, please include a current phone number in the event of any questions. Please enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope, if you would like a receipt mailed back to you. You may also pay online at <u>www.willingtonct.gov</u> and click on "OnLine Payments" under the "Citizen Action Center".

Why did I get a motor vehicle tax bill in December?

This is your motor vehicle supplemental bill. This bill was generated because you were issued a new motor vehicle registration, or have transferred an existing registration, at some time after Oct. 1, 2022, but before Sept. 30, 2023. You are being billed only for the number of months from your registration date until the end of the assessment year.

When is my Payment Due? When is it considered Late?

Payments due January 1, 2024 must be received, or postmarked, no later than Thursday February 1, 2024.

Interest is charged at a rate of 1 ½% per month from the due date, with a minimum interest charge of \$2.00.

Failure to receive a bill does not invalidate the tax or interest per CT State Statute.



School Building Committee

Willington School Building Committee: Final Report

The Willington School Building Committee submitted its final report to the Board of Selectmen and Board of Education in November 2023. Despite the failed referendum, the School Building Committee believes:

- The existing school facilities at Hall and Center are in need of significant and very costly improvements to maintain their integrity for continued use and to support the advancement of a contemporary educational model into the future. The SBC's efforts support the recommendation that new school construction is anticipated to have the most advantageous cost-benefit analysis in the long term.
- The most effective and efficient means of implementing a combined PK-8 school is through new construction on a new site.
- The property identified by the SBC as the proposed site of the new school is an excellent site candidate for the proposed use, and of the properties examined at the time of the study it remains the most advantageous available.
- The Town should consider its land inventory, if not open space, and perhaps sell the unneeded parcels to purchase a more suitable lot for a future school.
- The Town should actively plan for a significant financial investment in school infrastructure improvements (either new construction or renovations) within the next few years. It is important for taxpayers to understand that the state will not provide reimbursement for the majority of school improvement projects when done through the CIP process.
- The Town may consider connecting with their local elected officials (senator, state representative) to determine if they would support special legislation to get Willington a higher reimbursement rate for a renovation project or a new school.

Fenton-Ruby Park and Wildlife Preserve:

Moose Meadow Road and Burma Road; hiking/walking trails, bird watching, fishing, non-motorized boating, cross country skiing, snow shoeing and picnic area.

Knowlton Property:

Mason Road - Hiking Trails

Willington's Public Works Department constructed a parking lot for hiking trail access on Mason Road. This lot will allow safe parking for access to the Talmadge Spur Trail and the Knowlton Spur Trail. Both trails connect to the Nipmuck Trail, part of the Connecticut Blue Trail System.

Talmadge Tract:

Mason Road – Hiking Trails (adjacent to the Knowlton Property)

Chenes Roches Preserve:

Chenes Roches (transl. oaks rocks) is a 56-acre wooded preserve in northeast Willington and owned by Joshua's Tract Conservation and Historic Trust. Trails wind through a varied terrain of hardwood forests, stands of pines and along a hemlock-shaded stream in a steep-sided valley. A round trip of 1.8 miles will take you across several small spring-fed streams and an altitude change of about 250 feet from the parking lot to the valley stream. A trail map and additional information about the preserve, including directions, can be found on the Joshua's Trust website, **joshuastrust.org**. There is a kiosk with trail maps at the small parking area 500 feet past the south end of Laurel Drive. *Please stay on the trail and respect boundaries where the trail passes near private property*. Note: The parking area is not plowed in the winter and parking on the road is not advisable.

Kevin Legare Memorial Fields - 40 Old Farms Road:

Baseball and Softball fields

The Park on Village Hill Road:

Overlooking the Roaring Brook, a popular fishing spot during fishing season.

River Road Athletic Complex - 511 River Road:

Randy Larner Memorial Baseball Field, basketball court, pavilion, playscape, swings, multi-sport field, volleyball sand court, walking path (one lap = .33 miles) and outdoor fitness equipment. No golfing allowed.

Dogs are welcome but must be leashed and cleaned up after. Doggie poo bags are available.

Complex is **CARRY IN-CARRY OUT**. Dogs are not allowed on the baseball field. **State Statute 22-364 states that dogs must be under the direct control of their owners at all times when using town parks. It is the dog owner's responsibility to clean up all dog waste.

Historical Society

Conservation Commission

Winter is a wonderful time to be outdoors! You can breathe fresh air without pollen worries, see the unique trunk and branch structure of the trees and find many animal tracks in the snow.

There are a variety of town-maintained trails to wander, including four at Fenton-Ruby Park off Burma Road and several on the Talmadge Conservation Tract and the Royal Knowlton Preserve properties off Mason Road. See the Conservation Commission webpage link below for more information.

Also make sure you add Chenes Roches Preserve (translation: "oaks rocks") to your hiking list. This is a 56-acre wooded preserve in northeast Willington owned by Joshua Tract Conservation and Historic Trust. Trails wind through a varied terrain of hardwood forests, stands of pines and along a hemlock-shaded stream in a steep-sided valley. A round trip of 1.8 miles will take you across several small spring-fed streams via bridges and an altitude change of about 250 feet from the parking lot to the valley stream. A trail map and additional information about the Preserve, including directions, can be found on the Joshua's Trust website: www.joshuastrust.org. There is a kiosk with trail maps in the small parking area at 71 Blair Road. Please stay on the trail and respect boundaries where the trail passes near private property.

The next time you are at Fenton Ruby park wander down to the pond and settle on a bench to view the beaver pond. Be still and you may see a beaver. Here are some fun beaver facts

- Beaver teeth are orange.
- Beavers are one of the few animals that modify their habitat.
- Beavers don't just build dams, Beavers slap their tails on the water to indicate danger. ...
- Beavers eat wood! Beavers are the largest rodents in North America. Beavers eat bark and cambium. Their favorites include willow, maple, poplar, beech, birch, alder, and aspen trees.
- Beavers usually have one mate for life, just like people do! Once a beaver is two-years-old, it leaves the family. In beaver years, being two is a lot like being old enough to go to college.
- Beaver families are territorial and defend against other families. >> In order to warn family members of danger, beavers slap their tails against the water, creating a powerful noise.
- Beavers eat bark and cambium (the softer growing tissue under the bark of trees). Their favorites include willow, maple, poplar, beech, birch, alder, and aspen trees. They also eat water vegetation as well as buds and roots

The Conservation Commission is recruiting interested townspeople to help manage our environmental resources and serve on the commission. The commission meets on the 3rd Wednesday of each month at 7 pm. Meetings may be virtual at this time. 2: Service in a war, campaign, or expedition on foreign soil or in hostile waters*. This can be proven by any of the following:

- An authorized campaign medal
- Receipt of Hostile Fire Pay or Imminent Danger Pay (verified by a military pay statement)
- Service in Korea for 30 consecutive or 60 non-consecutive days

*This information is usually available through a veteran's DD-214. If other information is needed or if a veteran's DD-214 is not complete, they can contact the National Personnel Records Center online or at 314.801.0800 to request more information.

The Newly Reopened Gardiner Hall Jr. History Museum

The Eastern Connecticut Center for History, Art, and Performance (EC-CHAP) nonprofit organization is happy to announce that the Gardiner Hall Jr. History Museum had its Grand Reopening on December 2nd, 2023, after months of planning, renovations, and upgrades. The local museum is housed at The Mill Works facility, formerly the Gardiner Hall Jr. Company thread mill (1860-1954) located at 156 River Road, Willington CT. Back in late February of 2023, EC-CHAP was selected as one of twelve organizations in the state to be awarded the Museum Makeover grant offered by Conservation ConneCTion and supported through a partnership with the Connecticut League of History Organizations with a grant from the CT Cultural Fund by CT Humanities and funding provided by the Connecticut Office of the Arts from the Connecticut State Legislature. The grant provided funds to upgrade the museum space along with expert advice from a team of museum curators.

After an initial visit by traveling curator Stephen Bartkus in March, planning began on a new museum exhibition layout. The "before" images of the museum with the blue flooring show that while there was an array of historical objects on display, the space certainly could benefit from a makeover. The priorities for the project would be focused on providing a more informative and enjoyable experience for guests while also improving the facility in order to optimize the preservation of historical artifacts.

The first step was to create six larger, professional text panels to tell the story of the mill, employees, the Hall family, and South Willington. Many weeks were spent on historical research followed by creating, editing, and designing the text panels now seen in the museum. In addition to the new text panels, one of our favorite photos of company employees was chosen to be enlarged into a 10-foot hanging fabric photograph, bringing a still image of 1920 work conditions to life. To enhance the presentation of historical objects, modern display cases were graciously donated to the cause from the Fairfield Museum & History Center and the Seymour Historical Society. The museum space now hosts multiple display cases featuring products of the Gardiner Hall Jr. Company and future businesses that occupied the mill, personal items of the Hall family, and relics from employees. More is to come as new pieces are put on display and the museum expands.

One of the most visually pleasing facility upgrades to the Gardiner Hall Jr. History Museum was changing the flooring. Previously, the blue tile floor was showing its age. Every piece of the museum was removed and put into storage so commercial carpeting could be installed. The carpet also extends into a newly created presentation room to be used for historical lectures and demonstrations. Lastly, the large early-20th century mill windows on the West wall of the museum received UV treatment. Upgraded blinds now span both windows and fully block the harmful effects of sunlight to sensitive museum artifacts.

After nine months of progress thanks to the Museum Makeover program, members of EC-CHAP along with traveling curators Stephen Bartkus, Ben Gammell, and Rich Malley completed the installation of the permanent exhibition *Threads in Time* in November, 2023. *Threads in Time* explores Willington's history, the impact of the Gardiner Hall Jr. Thread Company, the contributions of South Willington residents and employees, and the Hall family. EC-CHAP invites everyone to stop by the Gardiner Hall Jr. History Museum to see the renovated space and take in a part of Connecticut's rich local history.

Theresa MacNaughton: An Artist Interview

Theresa MacNaughton resides in Wethersfield, Connecticut with her husband and two rescue dogs. She has been creating art since she was a young child, when she would spend hours drawing imaginary characters with a ballpoint pen in lined notebooks. She studied art throughout high school and into college, receiving a bachelor's degree in fine arts and journalism from Southern Connecticut State University in New Haven, Connecticut. After dabbling in recreational painting for many years, Theresa opened Whimsy & Enchantment Art on Etsy, where she currently sells original art, as well as prints, note cards, journals, and other functional items featuring reproductions of her work. Collectors are drawn to her introspective and whimsical portraits of women, beautiful woodland creatures, and majestic birds of prey.



What type of work do you create? What materials do you use?

I specialize in mixed media art - combining paint, colored pencils, watercolor crayons, collage elements, antique book pages, inspirational quotes and poetry into one-of-a-kind pieces inspired by nature, magic, everyday whimsy, and deep reflection of the soul.

When and how did you begin making art?

I have always loved art and have been drawing for as long as I can remember. I was enrolled in art enrichment classes in grade school and had fun exhibiting all types of creations in art shows at my school. This love for art following me into high school and beyond.

How did you find your unique style?

After a period where I had stopped making art, I discovered the work of mixed media artist Suzi Blu online. Suzi's work was unlike any I had ever seen. I was fascinated by her work, mostly portraiture that was both whimsical and realistic, and began taking her classes to learn how to incorporate all these unexpected elements into composed paintings. From there, the online art community began to boom, and I networked and took classes from other well-known contemporary artists in the mixed media field.

Much of your work is female figures: are these people you know or imaginary people? Or facets of yourself?

They are all figments of my imagination. I like to explore the many facets of the soul, emotions, and mythology in my paintings. They come alive organically for me on the canvas. Sometimes, even I'm surprised with the results. Any facet of myself is purely coincidental. For animals and birds, I will use a source photo to capture their true essence.

Can you tell us about your creation process?

I create the backgrounds of my paintings first. Oftentimes, I will infuse the piece with affirmations before laying down any paint. I'll create depth and texture with collage papers, book pages, crayon marks and other tools, which I then cover with paint. I'll then distress it, allowing some of the background poke through. At that time, I will begin to create the imagery onto the page – a goddess, a bird, an owl – whatever speaks to me at the time. I'll finish the piece with paint splatters, doodles, embellishments, and an inspirational quote that speaks to the theme of the painting I'm working on.







Which artists do you appreciate and admire?

I've always loved Pierre-Auguste Renoir. I was a big fan of impressionist art in my teen years. I also like Arthur Rackham, John Anster Fitzgerald, Margaret Keane, Sulamith Wülfing, Edward Gorey, and Tasha Tudor.

What do you hope for viewers to experience in looking at your work?

I want them to experience joy, reflection, peace, and playfulness. Mostly, I want them to feel the heart that I've put into every piece.
