Board of Assessment Appeals

Pyrrhotite-Impaired Concrete

Applications and Engineer Evaluation forms to request reassessment of a property due to the use of defective concrete are available in the Assessor's Office and on the Town of Willington website. Please note, these forms must be accompanied by an engineer's report. For additional information, contact the Assessor's office @ 860-487-3122 or Nsnyder@willingtonct.gov.

Renters Rebate

Residents 65 years of age and older and persons that are totally disabled of any age may be eligible for the State Renters Rebate Program. Guidelines and applications are available from the Human Services Department between April 1st -October 1st.

Motor Vehicle Tax Bills

If you disposed of your vehicle and did not transfer the plate to a replacement vehicle, you may be entitled to a prorated tax credit. Provide the Assessor's Office with documentation showing proof of plate cancellation and disposal (e.g., bill of sale, insurance claim, junk receipt, etc.) to obtain the credit. Credits are available for vehicles on the 10/1/2021 and 10/1/2022 Grand Lists.

Take a Hike ... this Summer

The Conservation Commission opens the new "**Split Rock Trail**" on the Talmadge Conservation Tract!

The Town recently finalized the purchase of a 16-acre parcel from the Daniel Talmadge Estate on Mason Road. The Conservation Commission, on behalf of the Town, applied for and was awarded an Open Space and Watershed Land Acquisition Grant of \$81,250 from the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) to help conserve this property for natural resource protection and passive public recreation.

For those who enjoy Fenton Ruby Park, you might consider a change of pace and scenery by visiting Willington's 'other' open space and trail systems located on the Knowlton and Talmadge properties on Mason Road.

To access the properties and the trails, park in the gravel parking lot on the east side of Mason Road, located about 0.3 miles north of the intersection with Route 44 and 0.8 miles south of the intersection with Tinkerville School Road. The **"Split Rock Trail"** (blazed yellow) and the Talmadge Spur Trail (blazed yellow/blue) begin directly across Mason Road from the parking lot. The Knowlton Spur Trail (blazed blue/white) begins at the kiosk near the corner of the parking lot. Both 'spur' trails can be combined with the Nipmuck Trail to form a loop trail that begins and ends at the trailhead parking lot on Mason Road. Paper maps can be found at the trailhead kiosk or by scanning the QR code on the accompanying trail map.

The new "**Split Rock Trail**" heads south through a mixed forest then passes through a stone wall where it forks left and right to form a one-mile loop. Heading right, it traverses an area with several large stone outcrops, some with split rocks! From there the trail descends to a wide ravine and then ascends the side of a hill, where hikers can opt to turn left onto a short trail to the top of an outcrop that includes an overlook of the forest below. Return by the short trail to rejoin the main trail as it continues around the hill to an old woods road which takes a few turns before returning to the original fork by the stone wall.

We encourage everyone to spend some time on these trails and enjoy the benefits of the great outdoors!!

Colt and His Legacy in Hartford

Rather than focusing on Connecticut industry at large for this article in the *Connecticut Industry During Times of War* Series, I wanted to focus on a specific Connecticut industrialist. That being the highly influential Samuel Colt and his legacy. Samuel Colt was born in 1814 in Hartford, Connecticut and maintained an interest in pyrotechnics through his youth. Experiments involving pyrotechnics would see him kicked out of boarding school in 1830 after causing a fire damaging school property. His father then sent him off to learn to be a seaman that same year. It was here that Colt saw the clutch mechanism of a ship's wheel that inspired him to improve upon the revolver design (connecticuthistory.org).

Colt being the inventor of the revolver is not technically correct. Indeed, guns firing from a revolving cylinder had been around centuries before Colt. However, the cylinder or "wheel" of these wheelguns had to be turned and indexed by hand. Colt's revolutionary contribution was his idea of a manually operated hammer that would automatically revolve the cylinder and lock into the correct position for firing. He would receive a patent for his revolving pistol design and create his first company, the Patent Arms Manufacturing Company, in 1836 in the town of Paterson, New Jersey. This first venture was a failure with the company closing 7 years later. It wasn't until Captain Walker of the Texas Rangers asked Colt to make him 1,000 pistols of a new design that Colt would have the capital to establish his new business back in Connecticut: Colt's Patent Fire-Arms Manufacturing



Company (Museum of Connecticut History). Colt's design would now continue to see successful iterations and rising sales numbers.

One of Colt's greatest strengths was his marketing prowess. He would present engraved and gold decorated guns to notable individuals and heads of state to attract new orders via an early version of celebrity endorsement (Museum of CT History). If a news source mentioned Colt or talked negatively about his competitors, he would buy hundreds of copies of that edition and send the editor a free revolver with his inscription on it (Hosley 1999). He saw the value of mythmaking and catchy marketable slogans. Samuel Colt and later the Colt company would often market the product as an equalizer for the vulnerable against the powerful, a protector, or an essential part of rugged frontier life. In 1855, Colt built the Hartford factory complex complete with its Blue Onion dome atop the East Armory that we've all driven by on I-91. The complex, named Coltsville, spanned 260 acres complete with multiple factory buildings, recreation areas, worker housing, and Colt's personal mansion. In just a year, Colt's factory was producing 150 firearms a day. Although the assembly line concept is largely attributed to Henry Ford, Colt's Hartford location was one of the birthplaces of precision manufacturing and mass production (Eric Hintz, Smithsonian). Working with Elisha Root, the Colt factory had specialized machinery to assist in making identical parts, hastening the old process of hand fitting. Different steps of the process would then be done by employees in an assembly line fashion.

I mentioned the Blue Onion, but the one we are familiar with is not the original. Samuel Colt would die in 1862 and a fire would burn down most of the armory in 1864. The heir to his company would be his wife, Elizabeth Colt, who would lead the company until 1901. It was her decision to rebuild the structure, including the iconic blue dome, rather than close it down. The rampant colt that sat in Colt's private garden was used as the replacement to adom the top of the dome. A century later, the dome was in disrepair and efforts to do



maintenance caused the head of the colt to fall off. It was sold to Peter Tillou, an art dealer of Litchfield, who then sold it to the Museum of Connecticut History. The picture seen in this article is of the 1867 rampant colt statue that can be seen at the museum today. The colt that sits on the current Blue Onion was commissioned in the early 2000s and is made of fiberglass (National Park Service).

Samuel Colt was not only a revolutionary inventor, but a remarkable salesman, innovator, and industrialist. The Colt name is one that nears the top of the list in terms of Connecticut ingenuity throughout the years. Today, a collection of rare or early Colt firearms can be seen at the Museum of Connecticut History, where much of the information found in this article was sourced. Since 2014,

Coltsville has been in the process of becoming an official National Historic Park with the National Park Service. Colt Gateway, a management company currently owning most of the Colt complex, hosts apartments, commercial offices, an event venue, and the Greater Hartford Academy of the Arts Full Day high school. All of this helps maintain the spirit of innovation in this area and sees that the legacy of the Colt family continues to be preserved.

Return to Film Photography: A Personal Reflection

A friend recently spoke to me about the current popularity and resurgence of film photography in a world dominated by 1's and 0's. The idea percolated around in my head - and absent an Art related article this month from our regular AIR contributor, I thought I might put something together on the topic.

As I thought deeply on this subject, it grew into a personal reflection of my own journey with film photography. I became excited with the notion of looking back in time, and the elements that formed my love of photography. Time had numbed or suppressed this part of my life, and peeling back the years felt... well... good (this unplanned article may in fact result in future writing on this and other topics that led to EC-CHAP's existence).

With the reader's permission and patience, I am sharing a bit of my background and how I became involved with this medium. I am writing with the context of "film photography" representing the complete analog process from shutter press to final print.

I am not a digital photographer. I own a Cannon consumer DSLR camera received from my wife as a Christmas gift about seven years ago; but when it comes to every-day photos, I reach for my trusty iPhone.

My photographic background is with film. The combination of interests in the arts and pursuit of high quality images; along with technical inquisitiveness led to a passion for photography beginning in the early 1970's. This interest resulted in defining my undergraduate engineering program and culminating Mechanical Engineering degree from WPI, Worcester, MA.

When I entered college at WPI in 1972, a new and innovative project-based program was just being introduced and offered to students on an optional basis. It was called the "WPI Plan". This non-traditional approach to education included the following components and requirements for graduation:

Grading for classes was non-traditional. There were no "A's", "B's", "C's", etc. There
were only three grades: "Acceptable"; "Acceptable with Distinction"; or "No Record".
No Record meant you failed or did not complete the course, and there was no record of
the failure or incompletion on your transcript. You could continue to take the course until
you passed (or ran out of money); and ultimately were required to achieve a certain
number of credits as one of the graduating requirements.

Greg is also an adjunct professor of Jazz Studies at Rhode Island College and is also a very active jazz clinician with co. sponsorship from the Conn-Selmer Instrument Co., conducting workshops and master classes through the U.S and abroad. Greg has been inducted into the RI MUSIC HALL OF FAME 2016.

Who is Willington Fire Department #1? Meet our Suppression Apparatus

In this Willington Wire Special, we'll introduce you to our current engine-tankers (ETs) and our squad (SQ).

Engine tankers have both a fire pump to supply water to put out a fire as well as the ability to carry large amounts of water. This type of apparatus can supply water to the hoses needed to put out a fire, help move water from one place to another, or pump water out of a fire hydrant or pond.

Squads are typically a "do it all" apparatus. These pieces usually have smaller amount of water than an ET, but carry extrication tools (the jaws of life) and other rescue equipment to assist in car accidents and specialty incidents.

Engine tankers and squads are two types of apparatus which are commonly referred to as suppression apparatus. The role of a suppression apparatus is to put the fire out by supplying the water, hose, and tools necessary to do so.

	ET-213 is old but gold! Made in 1990, this International/Darley was our primary fire response apparatus until ET- 113 arrived. Just like ET-113, this piece has 2,000 gallons of water and 2,500 ft of hose total. When the season comes, ET-213 gets dressed up in holiday lights for all of the regional parades!
SQ-113 can do it all! A 2003 Freightliner/Darley, SQ-113 is equipped for a little bit of everything. From wildland firefighting tools, to extrication equipment and hazardous materials suits, SQ- 113 is a front runner for many call types. This piece typically responds to fires, car accidents, and special rescue type incidents where unique tools may be needed.

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




PROPERTY TAX BILLS HAVE BEEN MAILED

1st Installment Due by August 2, 2023

How can I pay My Bill?

The Revenue Office accepts cash, money orders or personal checks for payment at the office. If our office is closed, you can leave a check in one of our Drop Boxes located outside the front entrance of our building. Our mailing address is 40 Old Farms Rd, Willington CT 06279 if you want to mail in a payment, we would appreciate a contact phone number in the event we need to get in touch with you. Please enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope if you would like a receipt mailed back to you. You may also pay online at <u>www.willingtonct.gov</u> and click on the button that says "OnLine Payments". There is a convenience fee of 2.50% for credit cards, flat fee of \$3.95 for debit cards and \$0.95 for EFT. We also have a public kiosk at Town Hall for online credit/debit card payments. The same fees apply.

When is my Payment Due? When is it considered Late?

Payments due July 1, 2023 must be received, or postmarked, no later than August 1, 2023. Payments due January 1, 2024 must be received, or postmarked, no later than February 1, 2024.

Interest is charged at a rate of 1 ½% per month from the due date, with a minimum interest charge of \$2.00. *Per §12-146, Interest cannot be waived.*

You are being taxed on Real Estate, Personal Property and Motor Vehicles as of October 1, 2022.

Real Estate – All real property listed on the Grand List.

Personal Property – In the most general terms, personal property is everything subject to ownership, excluding land, any interest in land or any permanent improvement thereon. It is property that is not permanently affixed to or part of real estate. By its very nature then, personal property is moveable. This broad definition includes tangible items such as airplanes, campers, unregistered vehicles, items for business as furniture, fixtures, equipment, and animals.

Registered Motor Vehicles – Vehicles listed with the Department of Motor Vehicles are coded by tax town, and the Assessor is provided a list of registered vehicles annually. Willington's Town Code is 160.

All tax bills are mailed directly to property owners unless the Tax Collector receives specific instructions to send the bill to your bank or financial institution.

Real Estate and Personal Property tax totaling \$100 or more are due in two installments; July and January. Motor vehicle tax is due in one installment in July. Please note, we do not send out bills for the second installment in January. There is a stub on the July bills for the January payment.

Wishing everyone a healthy, happy and prosperous summer! We look forward to seeing you soon.

Failure to receive a bill does not invalidate the tax or interest per CT State Statute.

Happy summer, everyone!

It is still not too late to license your dogs! Did you know all dogs aged 6 months or older must be licensed, per Connecticut General Statute §22-342? This also pertains to any dog being boarded in a kennel or even headed to the groomer!

It is simple to license: please bring in a valid rabies certificate along with a spay/neuter verification (if applicable). The fees are \$8 for each spayed/neutered dog and \$19 for



each male/female dog. Please note there is an additional \$1 penalty per dog for the month of July or each month thereafter. More information can be found at: willingtonct.gov/town-clerk. – dog licensing.

We enjoy seeing our 4 legged residents! Please send us a photo of your dog for our "dog wall" located near the service counter in the Town Clerk's office. The bulletin board gets a lot of attention when people come to conduct business and we like to show them off!

This time of year, we also see an influx of marriage licenses. If you are planning to be married, please

note that a marriage license is valid for 65 days after it has been received by the couple. The license must be obtained by the Town Clerk in the Town of occurrence. More information (as well as the required worksheet) can be found on the Town Clerk's webpage noted above.

Veterans who served in the military during a time of war (or Active Military), and own property or motor vehicles in the Town of Willington may file their military discharge paperwork. In order to be eligible to receive tax exemptions, the original DD214 (or a certified copy) must be filed with the Town Clerk by September 30th. If you have questions regarding your exemption qualifications, please contact the Assessor's office at 860-487-3122. We hope everyone enjoys their summer!

Corporal Henry Toberman Post No. 938

There are two qualifiers for membership in the VFW, as set out in our National Bylaws. An individual must meet both in order to become a member. They are as follows:

1: Honorable Service – must have served in the Armed Forces of the United States and either received a discharge of Honorable or General (Under Honorable Conditions) or be currently serving.

2: Service in a war, campaign, or expedition on foreign soil or in hostile waters^{*}. This can be proven by any of the following:

- An authorized campaign medal
- Receipt of Hostile Fire Pay or Imminent Danger Pay (verified by a military pay statement)
- Service in Korea for 30 consecutive or 60 non-consecutive days

RESPECTING ADOLPH

It was January 7th, 1945, three years and one month to the day since the Empire of Japan sought to impose their hegemony on the Pacific by bombing Pearl Harbor and invading the Philippines.

That was a bold, if poorly calculated, move. Their attack on Pearl Harbor wrecked the American battleship fleet, but battleships were already obsolete and they missed the American aircraft carriers completely.

They successfully invaded and occupied the Philippines. The main effect of this was teaching the Filipinos that being occupied by the Americans was much better than being occupied by the Japanese.

Perhaps the Japanese should have listened to one of their own statesmen, Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto. His response to the Japanese victory at Pearl Harbor was, "I fear all we have done is to awaken a sleeping giant and fill him with a terrible resolve." Now, three years and one month later, the giant was fully awake. The surface of the Pacific Ocean was an American lake filled with American ships. Most of the Japanese Navy was at the bottom of the that Ocean.

There was still work to be done. There was still a price to be paid. On that January 7th, a flight of F6 Hellcats took off from the deck of the USS Hancock to bomb and strafe Japanese airfields on the Island of Luzon. One of the hellcats was either struck by ground fire or caught in the blast of a secondary explosion on the ground. The aircraft exploded in a ball of flame and was no more.

Adolph Wochomurka was born in Willington, Connecticut on August 13, 1920. He was the elder of two sons of Charles Wochomurka, the chief operating officer of the Parizek button mills. Adolph was very popular and well liked in town. In the normal course of events he likely would have grown up to be one of the leaders of Willington.

But then, Pearl Harbor happened. Adolph joined the Navy Air Corps and went off to fight for his country. He was lost over Luzon. The manner in which he was lost meant there were no remains to be returned to Willington.

How awful that must have been for his family and for the people of Willington. His family was wealthy and probably would have given it all up if they could get their son back, but that's not the way the world works. They erected a large and beautiful monument in the Willington Hill Cemetery. There is no one buried under that strikingly carved stone. Still, it is a fitting memorial for a young man who risked, and gave, his life for his country. There was more. The family received the \$10,000 death gratuity from the government. In 1945, \$10,000 was a great deal of money. The family was wealthy, they didn't need the money; but they found a good use for it. They owned a piece of land at the base of Y Road. They used the money to build a large and beautiful pond there. This was to serve as a tribute to their lost son and was named Wochomurka Pond.

The years went by. Adolph's parents died. His brother moved far away. The family's holdings in town were all sold off. This included the land with the pond. The small shack that had been on the land expanded and expanded again until today it is a beautiful large house on a beautiful large tract of land with a beautiful pond in front of it.

The pond has lost its name and to me that is a damn shame. I get it. The people who own the land want to claim that pond for their own. Why shouldn't they name it after themselves? But I can't help but think that it was a memorial to a man who gave his life for his country. It still saddens me

One other incident makes me wonder why Adolph Wochomurka can't get the respect he deserves. Every year the town of Willington has a Memorial Day program. Each year a dignitary is asked to address the crowd with a keynote speech.

It came to pass that one year an officer from UConn ROTC gave the keynote speech. It was a good speech as such speeches go, and towards the end he read off the names of Willington boys who have given their lives in our various wars. The names were read in alphabetical order. As he neared the end of the list he read the name Albert Wochomurka.

I was disturbed. After the ceremony I tracked the speaker down. I asked him whence he got the name Albert. He pointed out that the name Adolph is toxic and no longer used in polite company. When he saw the name on the list he thought quickly and changed it to something less offensive.

When Adolph Wochomurka was born that other Adolph was a poor war veteran selling postcards on the streets of Vienna, his eventual infamy far in the future. I don't know who young Wochomurka was named after, but it was not that Adolph.

Can we give him some respect, and at least let him keep his name? Maybe we could do something to memorialize this man who was a true hero?

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
