## **Animal Control**



Willington Animal Control is the municipal shelter and animal law enforcement department for the Town of Willington, CT. We house stray dogs in our kennel as well as investigate and enforce laws pertaining to animals within town boundaries.

Our mission is to achieve the most efficient and effective use of resources for the benefit of the citizens and animals, to create an environment in which people can move about safely, and to minimize euthanasia by promoting our facility's pets for adoption in as many ways as possible and to

maintain management excellence.

This department has one "on call" officer which performs a variety of services to assist both humans and animals. The officer impounds stray/roaming dogs, controls animals which pose a threat to the public, assists injured/sick stray animals and wildlife, and will pick up and try to reunite roaming dogs with their owners and if no owner is found, the officer advertises the animal to find a suitable home if possible.

The officer also enforces all Connecticut laws pertaining to animals. All complaints and cruelty cases are investigated and infractions or arrests can be made if a person is found to be in non-compliance with the law.

## **Assessor**



The Board of Assessment Appeals will hold a session to hear appeals of 2017 Motor Vehicle Values on Monday, September 17, 2018 @ 40 Old Farms Rd, Willington, CT from 7:00 pm - 8:30 pm. Those aggrieved by the assessed value of their motor vehicle listed on the 2017 Grand List may attend. No application is necessary.

## Office of the Assessor LEGAL NOTICE

In accordance with Connecticut General Statute 12-40, all persons who are liable to pay taxes on tangible personal property belonging to them on October 1, 2018 are hereby notified that they must file a declaration of their personal property on or before November 1, 2018, with the Assessor, or be subject to an estimated assessment and the statutory 25% penalty. Various exemptions are explained on the declaration and available if filed on time.

NO DECLARATION IS REQUIRED FOR MOTOR VEHICLES REGISTERED IN WILLINGTON CT NO DECLARATION IS REQUIRED FOR REAL ESTATE

Personal property includes, but is not limited to, unregistered motor vehicles (including junk autos), campers, all business machinery, equipment, tools, commercial furniture and fixtures.

#### **DEFECTIVE CONCRETE**

Applications and Engineer Evaluation forms to request reassessment of residential property due to defective concrete are available in the Assessor's Office and on the Town of Willington website. Please note, these forms must be accompanied by an Engineer's report. For additional information, contact the Assessor's office.

Filing deadlines for various exemptions and classifications for the 2018 Grand List are as follows:

#### **PUBLIC ACT 490**

All applications for classification of forestland must be received by October 1, 2018. All applications for classification of farmland and open space must be received by October 31, 2018.

#### **VETERANS**

All property owners claiming exemption due to military service must file their DD214 form with the Town Clerk by September 30, 2018. Discharge paperwork is only filed once. This information is for NEW veterans. Veterans claiming disability exemption must submit proof from the Veterans Administration. PA 85-573 allows veterans an additional exemption if their income is within the approved limits. This application must be filed by October 1 bi-annually.

#### **DISABILITY**

Persons totally disabled receiving SSD benefits may be eligible for a \$1000 property exemption. Proof of award and application must be submitted by October 1, 2018.

**HOMEOWNERS & TOTALLY DISABLED** Residents 65 years of age or totally disabled may be eligible for a tax credit on real estate; income guidelines apply and are adjusted each year. You must request an application in February 2019 and file it on or before May 15, 2019.

#### **RENTERS**

Residents 65 years of age or totally disabled may be eligible for the State Renters Rebate Program. Guidelines and applications will be available from the Human Services Department between April 1, 2019-October 1, 2019.

The Assessor's Office is open to receive the above lists and applications Monday 12:30-7:30 and Tuesday through Friday from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm.

## **Burning Official**

## Open Burning Requirements—The following requirements are effective January 1, 2000.

The Fire Marshal will issue all 'Open Burning Permits'. Permits can be obtained by calling (860) 429-7757. If the Fire Marshal is not available, please leave a message with your name, address, and phone number. The Fire Marshal will get back to you as soon as possible.

- Burning Permit requests will be taken Monday through Thursday Only.
- Permits will then be delivered to the Willington Fire Department #1 on Friday mornings. The Willington Fire Department #1 is located at 426 River Road, Willington CT. Please schedule your project accordingly.
- Burning is to be Done by Permit ONLY. Failure to obtain a permit may result in police action. You may only burn on a low or moderate fire hazard day. Once you receive the permit you must call (860) 424-3630, or go to... www.ct.gov/dep or www.tollandcounty911.com to see the burning index for that day online. There is no longer the requirement to call the dispatch center.

#### These are the rules that apply to burning brush:

- Brush must be 4 inches or less in diameter.
- The fire must be attended at ALL times.
- Burning must be on the property for which the permit is issued. Houses under construction and businesses may NOT burn.
- Burning must be conducted between 10 am and 5 pm on sunny or partly sunny days with wind speeds less than 15 miles per hour. The fire must be completely out by 5 pm.
- Burning isn't allowed during High or Extreme Hazard conditions.

The following items are NOT to be burned - Demolition waste, garbage, paper, plastic, painted materials, rubber, metal, leaves or stumps.

Complaints received about unattended fires or fires left burning, can lead to the State of Connecticut Department of Environmental Protection issuing a 'cease recreation burning' for the occupant and/or property owner. Brush can also be taken to the Transfer Station on Hancock Rd, Willington during normal operating hours.

#### Permits are NOT required for the following:

- 1. Barbecues or other outdoor cooking.
- 2. Campfires, bonfires with brush under 3-inch diameter and 4-foot diameter circle for recreational or other activities including ceremonial purposes. All fires must be completely out when finished.



## **Conservation Commission**



Summer is here and the members of the Conservation Commission hope that you will take the opportunity to put your feet on the ground along some of the trails through the forests and along

the waterways in the preserved natural areas we are fortunate to have in Willington.

The 300-acre Fenton-Ruby Park and Wildlife Preserve and Drobney Sanctuary on Moose Meadow Road has 4-plus miles of trails through woods, over ridges and along ponds and streams. A kiosk with maps is located at the parking area on Burma Road, and a box with nature trail guides is located a short distance down the Taylor Trail. Several picnic tables and benches are available in the picnic area adjacent to the parking lot and a wildlife observation deck overlooks the Beaver Pond. Dogs are welcome to accompany owners, but must be kept on a leash for their safety and to protect the Park's wildlife.

Getting around on any of the 4 main trails is easy. Most trails can be walked in 30-45 minutes. Trail maps are located at all trail intersections to help orient you if there are no maps at the kiosk or if you choose not to carry a paper map. For more adventure, consider using the Park's trail system to hike to the Langhammer Preserve in Ashford. Start by taking the Park's Ruby Trail to the Ashford Link Trail. From there, it's only another 0.1 miles to Lustig Road in Ashford, where you can connect to the Ashford Trail immediately across the road.

The 28-acre Talmadge Tract, which contains the Talmadge Spur Trail with 1 ½ and 2-mile loops, will take you through scenic woodlands and along gravel Mason Road. This tract abuts the 400-acre UConn Moss Forest Tract, and on the other side of Mason Road is the 138acre Royal Knowlton Preserve. Several miles of the Connecticut Blue Trail (Nipmuck) run through this area, with a portion along the Fenton River as it flows through a deep ravine. The 3/4-mile Knowlton Spur Trail connects the Nipmuck Trail to the Talmadge Trail. Paper maps can usually be found on the sign at the Talmadge trailhead on Mason Road across from the gravel parking area, and also at the sign where the Nipmuck Trail crosses Mason Rd onto the Knowlton Preserve. Brochures and trail maps for these areas, as well as for Fenton-Ruby Park can be found on the Conservation Commission website (see below).

Chenes Roches (translation: "oaks rocks") is a 56-acre wooded preserve in northeast Willington owned by Joshua's Tract Conservation and Historic Trust. Trails wind through a varied terrain of hardwood forests, stands of pines and along a hemlock-shaded stream in a steep-sided valley. A round trip of 1.8 miles will take you across several small spring-fed streams via new bridges added by volunteers this June and an altitude change of about 250 feet from the parking lot to the valley stream. A trail map and additional information about the preserve, including directions, can be found on the Joshua's Trust website, www.joshuastrust.org.

There is a kiosk with trail maps at the small parking area 500 feet past the south end of Laurel Drive. *Please stay on the trail and respect boundaries where the trail passes near private property.* 

If you are interested in taking an active part in helping the Town manage its environmental resources, the Commission has openings for alternate members. Alternate members participate in meetings and may be seated as voting members in the absence of regular members. Anyone is welcome to attend our meetings in the lower level of the Town Office Building on the third Wednesday of every month. ## Fire Safety Tips



When the weather turns cold most people spend more time inside their homes using fireplaces, furnaces, and heaters to keep warm. There's nothing quite as cozy as a fire,

but it presents some safety hazards. Keep these tips in mind.

#### Service Your Furnace

Before the cold autumn and winter weather sets in, be sure to call your heating and cooling company to service your furnace. A specialist should inspect the furnace to make sure everything is in working order and that there are no leaks.

#### **Use Fireplaces Safely**

Keep that fire in its proper place by using a fireplace screen to keep sparks from flying out of the fireplace. Never leave a burning fire unattended, and make sure a fire in a fireplace is completely out before going to bed.

#### **Use Caution with Space Heaters**

A space heater can be an effective way to warm up a chilly room, but it's essential that you read the instructions on the unit before you use it. If your space heater requires venting, make sure you have vented it to the outdoors. Never use your stove or oven to heat your home; only use space heaters that are approved for this purpose. Always allow at least three feet of empty area around space heaters.

#### **Exercise Candle Caution**

Candles are a great way to give a room that warm glow, but they can also cause fires. According to the National Candle Association, almost 10,000 home fires start with improper candle use. Never leave candles burning if you go out or go to sleep, and keep your candles away from pets and kids.

#### **Change Smoke Alarm Batteries**

Change the batteries in your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors when you turn back your clocks for Daylight Savings Time. Make sure to check the alarms with the new batteries installed. Check and replace any home fire extinguishers that have expired.

## **Lyme Disease Prevention**

Preventing Lyme disease takes thoughtful preparation. It requires that you prevent ticks from getting on your skin. When you go outside into areas where ticks can be found, it is helpful to:

- Avoid tall grass and over-grown, brushy areas.
- Stay in the middle of the trails when hiking in the woods.
- Wear light-colored clothing so the ticks can be easily seen.
- Wear long pants to provide a better barrier than shorts.
- Tucking pants into socks creates a barrier and ticks will not be able to get to your skin.
- Wear long-sleeved shirts and closed shoes when in tick infested areas.
- Use insect repellent to significantly reduce the chance of tick bites and the transmission of Lyme disease and other tick-borne diseases.
- DEET is the primary active ingredient in most tick repellents and is considered the most effective. It must be used as directed on the container.
- Examine yourself, your children, and pets for ticks when returning indoors.
- Remove feeding ticks as soon as possible. Ticks need to feed for 24 hours before transmission occurs.
- When returning indoors, shower using a wash cloth or buff to remove walking ticks on your body. Ticks have a tendency to walk on the body before biting and feeding.
- Talk to your veterinarian to find out how to protect your pets from tick bites.

The sooner ticks are removed from the body the less likely you will get Lyme disease. Most people with Lyme disease do not remember being bitten by a tick because a tick bite is not felt; unlike mosquito bites. Ticks are very small and difficult to see, and many people do not get the expanding red rash that resembles a bull's eye and identifies Lyme disease infection.

If you have any signs or symptoms of Lyme disease, especially after a tick bite, contact your doctor right away.

#### **Policies & General Information**

<u>Fees:</u> There will be a \$20.00 fee for all checks returned as unpaid due to insufficient funds, stop payment, or any other form of cancellation. Payments shall be made by check or cash. Non-Resident Policy: Non-residents will be charged an additional \$5.00/\$10.00 depending on the program/bus trip.

## **Horseshoe Pitching World Tournament**



Nine Willington residents attended the 2018 National Horseshoe Pitchers Association World Tournament held in July in Florence, South Carolina, with 4 National Association members competing.

Ally Jordan succeeded in earning a fourth-place finish in the Junior Girls Championship round where she pitched over 32% ringers. In the preliminary round, she pitched over 36% ringers

which entitled her to advance to the championship round.

Bill Navratil, past Connecticut State Horseshoe Pitching Champion, advanced to the Senior Men's Division Championship round.

Both Roxanne Navratil and John Gregory earned third place trophies in their respective classes in the preliminary tournaments.

While this was the first World Tournament for John and Ally, this is the ninth World Tournament for Bill and the fifth for Roxanne. The World Tournaments are held every year at different locations. Bill has competed in tournaments in Utah, Alabama, New York, Tennessee, Iowa, Pennsylvania, Louisiana and this year in South Carolina. Next year the tournament will be held in Texas.

This year the World Tournament included over 1,000 pitchers from 4 countries. The tournament has divisions scheduled for pitching all day for 12 days with individuals competing for up to 4 hours a day for between 3 and 6 days. Pitchers find that the tournaments are fun, a chance to meet again with other horseshoe enthusiasts, meet new people, compete with others who are at their skill level and enjoy the mental and physical challenge of horseshoe pitching.

## **Public Works**

#### **Summer Hours:**

The Public Works Department summer hours are Monday through Thursday, 6 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. They will resume their regular hours (Monday through Friday 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on September 10, 2018.

#### **Mailboxes**

The front of your mailbox should be six inches behind the curb of the road. This is a good time to check your mailbox and see that it is sturdy and will withstand a hard winter.

#### Chip Sealing

Chip sealing will be done on the following roads over the next couple of weeks: Blair Road, Cemetery Road, Cosgrove Road, Lisa Lane and Spak Road.

#### **Summer Weather**

This summer has been particularly challenging with the torrential rain storms Willington has had. The crew has been busy repairing roads/driveway runoff due to these rains. If you have requested the crew to come fix an area near you, please be patient and it will be taken care of.

#### Last Year's Winter

Last year's winter was extra long and challenging. The crew is still working on repairs caused by winter damage.

#### **Be Safe Around Downed Power Lines**

If you come across a downed utility wire of any kind, always do the following:

- Assume it's energized and stay as far away as you can. Energized lines can charge the ground near the point of contact and may electrocute you. If a person or pet comes into contact with a downed power line, remain clear. Do not touch them or the wire.
- Call 911 or the utility serving the location. Leave everything to utility professionals and emergency personnel.
- Do not drive over downed power lines. Even if they're not energized, downed wires can get entangled with your vehicle and cause further damage.
- Stay in your car. If a power line falls on your vehicle while you're driving, do not exit until you know for sure that the line is de-energized.
- If you must evacuate, jump away and land with both feet together. Do not touch the vehicle while stepping on the ground, as this can create a path for electricity to run through you.
- Shuffle away to safety. Keep your feet together and take small, shuffling steps until you're at least 35 feet away. Taking larger steps can also create a path for electricity to run through you.

## 4-H Happenings



Fall in Connecticut is a time of transitions – leisurely mornings change to early wake times for school, hot humid nights make way for cool blanket weather, and summer sports and activities come to an end to make way for new opportunities.

4-Hers in Willington are also in a period of transition as they complete projects and look ahead to the October 1<sup>st</sup> start of the new 4-H year. Many members participated at the Tolland County 4-H Fair which was held August 10-12 at the Tolland Agricultural Center in Vernon. The fair was the culminating event for months of study and work on various projects, including: natural science, food preservation, artwork, flower and vegetables, and small gas engines. Throughout the weekend, 4-H members also showed their various animal projects – alpaca, beef, dog, goat, poultry and rabbits. ## PROPERTY TAX BILLS HAVE BEEN

1st Installment Due by August 1, 2018

#### How can I pay My Bill?

The Revenue Office accepts cash, money orders or personal checks for payment at the office. If our office is closed, you can leave a check in our Drop Box outside the front door of the building. Our mailing address is 40 Old Farms Rd, Willington CT 06279 if you want to mail in a payment. Please enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope if you would like a receipt mailed back to you. You may also pay on line at <a href="https://www.willingtonct.org">www.willingtonct.org</a> and click on the button that says "OnLine Payments". There is a convenience fee of 2.95% for credit cards and \$1.95 for EFT. We also have a public kiosk at Town Hall for on-line credit/debit card payments. The same fees apply.

## When is my Payment Due? When is it considered Late?

Payments due July 1, 2018 must be received, or postmarked, no later than August 1, 2018. Payments due January 1, 2019 must be received, or postmarked, no later than February 1, 2019.

Interest is charged at a rate of 1 ½% per month from the due date, with a minimum interest charge of \$2.00. **Per** §12-146, interest cannot be waived.

#### What am I being Taxed on?

You are being taxed on Real Estate, Personal Property and Motor Vehicles as of October 1, 2017.

Real Estate – All real property listed on the Grand List.

Personal Property – In the most general terms, personal property is everything subject to ownership, excluding land, any interest in land or any permanent improvement thereon. It is property that is not permanently affixed to or part of real estate. By its very nature then, personal property is moveable. This broad definition includes tangible items such as airplanes, campers, unregistered vehicles, items for business as furniture, fixtures, equipment, and animals.

Registered Motor Vehicles – Vehicles listed with the Department of Motor Vehicles are coded by tax town, and the Assessor is provided a list of registered vehicles annually. Willington's Town Code is 160.

All tax bills are mailed directly to property owners unless the Tax Collector receives specific instructions to send the bill to your bank or financial institution.



## Tax Collector Continued...

Real Estate and Personal Property tax totaling \$100 or more are due in two installments; July and January. Motor vehicle tax is due in one installment in July. Please note, we do not send out bills for the second installment in January. There is a stub on the July bills for the January payment.

## Fenton-Ruby Park and Wildlife Preserve:

Moose Meadow Road and Burma Road; hiking/walking trails, bird watching, fishing, non-motorized boating, cross country skiing, snow shoeing and picnic area.

#### **Knowlton Property:**

Mason Road - Hiking Trails

Willington's Public Works Department recently finished constructing a parking lot for hiking trail access on Mason Road. This lot will allow safe parking for access to the Talmadge Spur Trail and the Knowlton Spur Trail. Both trails connect to the Nipmuck Trail, part of the Connecticut Blue Trail System.

#### **Talmadge Tract:**

Mason Road – Hiking Trails (adjacent to the Knowlton Property)

#### **Chenes Roches Preserve:**

Chenes Roches (transl. oaks rocks) is a 56-acre wooded preserve in northeast Willington and owned by Joshua's Tract Conservation and Historic Trust. Trails wind through a varied terrain of hardwood forests, stands of pines and along a hemlock-shaded stream in a steep-sided valley. A round trip of 1.8 miles will take you across several small spring-fed streams and an altitude change of about 250 feet from the parking lot to the valley stream. A trail map and additional information about the preserve, including directions, can be found on the Joshua's Trust website, joshuastrust.org. There is a kiosk with trail maps at the small parking area 500 feet past the south end of Laurel Drive. *Please stay on the trail and respect boundaries where the trail passes near private property.* 

Note: The parking area is not plowed in the winter and parking on the road is not advisable.)

### Wetlands Benefits



Wetlands can minimize the damage to downstream property owners by decreasing the velocity of the water and acting as a storage basin. When a stream overflows its banks, it spreads horizontally into a surrounding wetland where the vegetation acts as numerous tiny barriers temporarily detaining the water.

Along with controlling flood waters, wetlands also serve to maintain water quality. The have a "self-cleaning" ability which, if not overtaxed, can filter, or take up, pollutants from runoff before they enter an adjoining watercourse. In many respects, wetlands

function much like sophisticated sewage treatment plants by removing nutrients and other pollutants prior to discharge to a waterway. This is done at virtually no cost to the taxpaying public.

A wetland acts as a buffer zone to trap sediments resulting from natural and main-induced erosion. However, increased development along many of the state's watercourses can hinder our wetlands' capability to trap these sediments. Often special measures need to be taken to decrease the sediment runoff in urbanizing areas.

Wetlands provide essential wildlife habitat as well. A large number of animals use wetlands as their sole habitat, while others exploit the wetland from time to time for breeding, feeding, or refuge. All wetlands function in providing an important source of food for wildlife and thus represent a critical link in life cycles and food webs.

#### WETLAND FORMATION

Many of our wetlands and watercourses had their beginnings approximately 15,000 years ago when the continental glacier, thousands of feet thick, advanced over Connecticut. The glacier scoured the existing bedrock, picking up large quantities of loose material which was subsequently deposited as the glacier melted. These unconsolidated glacial deposits were laid down over the bedrock to become the parent material from which our present mineral soils are formed.

Blocks of ice from the receding glacier which were surrounded by the glacial debris melted and left depressions in the land. The depressions, called kettleholes, and other areas that were flattened by the glacier had poor drainage and became the sites of future organic soils. Meltwaters flowing from the receding glacier filled depressions in the land, flowing slowly into rivers depositing the finer sands and silts of the glacier along the river banks and thereby became the parent material for future terrace, flood plain and alluvial soils.
